# Electronics recycling event coming to MainPlace Mall

MainPlace Mall

Got some e-waste that needs a safe dropoff site?

MainPlace Mall in Santa Ana will host a free drivethru event from 1 to 4 p.m. April 24 where area residents can drop off used electronics to be recycled. Some items — including computers, servers, laptops, tablets, hard drives, monitors, televisions, all-in-one printers, copiers, scanners and mobile phones — require a recycling certificate to be dropped off. Reps with the mall said those certificates will be available the day of the recycling event.

If customers need a hard drive wiped clean, they'll be charged \$7 for the service from California Electronics.

Other items, from keyboards and mice to DVD and VHS players, printers, fax machines, radios, alarm clocks, speakers and satellite dishes, can be discarded at no charge through this recycling event.

Items that cannot be accepted at the event include appliances, paint, hazardous materials, adhesives, liquids, chemicals, furniture, batteries, lightbulbs and fluorescent tubes.

The event will occur in the outer parking lot along Main Street. The first 100 vehicles to bring an item for recycling will get a \$15 gift card redeemable at certain MainPlace Mall retailers. It's one gift card per vehicle and while sup-
